



Enchanted Rock Hurricane Beryl Response

Unwavering support through the storm

Hurricane Beryl struck the Texas Gulf Coast in July 2024, leaving millions without power in 90-degree temperatures as diesel generators failed and over-the-road fuel deliveries were disrupted. But not at the 300+ sites powered by Enchanted Rock, where our dual-purpose microgrids provided 7,800+ hours of outage coverage.

Statewide impact

- 7,800+ hours of outage coverage across 168 affected sites statewide
 - 6,552+ hours supporting retail establishments enabling people to purchase food, water, ice, gas, medications and more (H-E-B, Walmart, Buc-ee's)
 - 474+ hours supporting industrial facilities
 - 344+ hours supporting assisted living/senior/retirement facilities
 - 296+ hours supporting water plants/MUDs (Fort Bend LID, etc.)
 - 154+ hours supporting other critical services
- 140+ microgrid sites operated simultaneously at peak

Houston highlights

- 146 of 155 commissioned sites were covered during Hurricane Beryl
- 94% of Houston sites provided with reliable power during outages
- Average Houston-area site covered for 52+ hours

Long-duration backup power

- Three sites at more than 180 hours (over 7 days) each
- Three additional sites at more than 150 hours (over 6 days) each
